

South Florida Orchid Society presents our Annual Orchid Auction. We have orchids from all over the world plus Orchid Art and Collectibles.



April is National Orchid Month

April has been designated National Orchid Month by the American Orchid Society to celebrate its 80-year anniversary and to increase awareness of the popular hobby of growing orchids. More people than ever are growing orchids, they have become the second most popular potted plants after Poinsettias.

World's Worst Smelling Orchid

The worst smelling orchid is Bulbophyllum phalaenopsis. We picked this particular Bulbophyllum due to the sheer size of the plant and flower and therefore the amount of scent it produces. Many other Bulbophyllums produce the same carrion scent as this one, but are much smaller. Native to New Guinea, the pollinator is a fly which is attracted by the unpleasant odor. Last year, I found a live webcam of an opening flower -- the grower couldn't stand the smell but wanted to see the flowers opening!

World's Tallest Orchid

The tallest freestanding orchid is Sobralia altissima from the high forests of Peru. It is reported to grow up to 44 feet or 13.5 meters high in optimum conditions. The bright reddish-purple flowers are up to 6 inches or 15 centimeters across and are displayed in spectacular groups of up to 8 flowers per stem.

GREEK MYTHOLOGY ON ORCHIDS

There is a Greek legend about how the name "Orchid" came about. It seems that there was a youth named Orchis who was the son of a nymph and a satyr. He was attending a festival of Bacchus, the God of Wine, one evening and indulged too much in the plentiful beverage. He let his passions get the better of him and accosted Bacchantes the favorite priestess. As satyrs are wont to do, he may have gotten carried away and raped her, but the details were fuzzy. Anyway, in response to his actions, the rest of the guests, enraged by his disrespect, tore him apart. His father begged the gods to make him whole again, but the gods refused. However, taking pity on the father, they did allow Orchids to be made from the remains of his body, thus bringing beauty into the world.

World's Smallest Orchid

The smallest orchid is Platystele jungermannioides which has flowers only half a millimeter or one-hundredth of an inch in diameter. The entire plant is only about a quarter of an inch or half a centimeter tall. They grow naturally in the cloud forests in Central America, principally in Costa Rica. The flower, when viewed through a magnifying glass, is a pale greenish color with a purple lip.

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THE NUN ORCHID

By How to Grow Orchids

The genus Phaius, also known as the nun orchid, although not one of the treasured 'commercials,' is satisfactory and easy to grow. The plant is terrestrial and epiphytic, handsomely ornamental, and usually pseudo bulbous. It has large fine leaves from the midst of which rise tall, erect stems bearing large, showy flowers. The coloring is odd with the frequent combination of white and yellow, while the outside of the petals, sepals, and lip is white. Phaius crosses readily with Calanthe. Description of the Nun Orchid: Phaius Cooksonii. (P. Wallichi x P. tuberculosus). Handsome hybrid. P. grandifolius, called by Schlechter from Bletchly 'P. Tankervilliae. Habitat China of the nun orchid: Malay Peninsula, Australia. Blooms May to July. Flowers showy, chocolate-brown inside, white outside; lip curled or trumpet-shaped, long, white, with crimson lines leading into the yellow throat. P. grandifolius var. superbus. Inside of the petals and sepals a brilliant chamois; lip bright amaranth, margined with rose. P. Humblotti. Habitat Madagascar of the nun orchid. Blooms June to July. Flowers large, rosy, showy; lip not tubular, but open and winged, with spreading basal lobe and white center, startlingly red. P. maculatus, also called flaws. Habitat China, Australia, Malay. Blooms April to May. Large pseudobulbs; leaves dark green, flecked with yellow. Bears ten to twelve flowers, yellow with chocolate-brown rolled lip. P. tuberculosus. Habitat Madagascar. Blooms May to June, according to Schlechter; winter, according to Sanders. Odd tubular lip gives name. Flowers large, up to 2% inches across; white sepals and broad white petals; lip yellow, spotted dark rose. P. Wallichi (wall'eech-i). Habitat Ceylon, India. Blooms various times. Flowers typical, white outside, orange-yellow, or buff; flushed amethyst inside.


Spathoglottis plicata or Ground orchid, native of Southeastern Asia to the Philippines, is the common species of Orchid which blooms round the year. This easily grown terrestrial herb has pretty, arching broad leaves with prominent parallel veins and a few or large cluster of small flowers at the end of a long stalk as tall as 1 metre arising from a basal leaf axil. The flowers are seen from the more common purple to white, yellow, peach, pink and magenta shades. and The leaves emerge from round pseudo bulbs that become increasingly multiple and larger as the orchid matures. Ground orchids can be grown as potted plants and also do well in beds and borders.

Propagation and Care:

It is an easy to grow, extremely adaptable orchid which blooms round the year. Propagation of Spathoglottis plicata is by division. Many plants can be separated from the large clump and can be planted in individual pots or in ground 3 to 6 inches apart. Before planting, enrich the soil with a mixture of garden soil, dried cow dung and leaf mould. Addition of broken bricks and charcoal makes the growing medium loose for roots to spread easily.

Heavy watering is essential during the growing season but allow the plant to get almost dry before watering again. Some good fertilizer can be used to enhance its growth. The plant requires medium shade to full sun and should be watered regularly. In warm places, partial shade is ideal.

Cut off the flower stems after it finishes blooming. Remove dead or rotted foliage regularly

Bob Clifford & Rodney Atkinson of Orlando Florida won second place for 25 square foot Hobby Class Table Top Exhibit titled "Our Bit 'O' Paradise.

In individual plant entries, numerous ribbons and trophies were awarded to deserving plants.

The Grand Champion of the show was awarded to Dendrobium spectabile owned and exhibited by Hawaiian Orchid Source, Honolulu, HI. The Reserve Grand Champion was awarded to Angest. Olympus 'Crystelle' owned and exhibit by Krull-Smith, Apopka, FL.

Needless to say, the South Florida Orchid Society's show was worth seeing. An evident spirit of cooperation among members in helping with the show was clearly demonstrated. The entire Show Committee and all those who helped are to be commended for a job well done.
