## SEPTEMBER SPEAKER ALAN KOCH

### How to Succeed with the Brazilian Cattleya Alliance in South Florida

This is a fun talk that covers over 35 popular Brazilian species and gives some insight on how to be successful in growing them. It covers the most current hybrids using these species as the building blocks and talks about world direction in breeding with them. Even the experienced grower will learn a few new tricks on how to be a better grower.

Alan Koch owns and operates Gold Country Orchids where he specializes in miniature and compact Cattleya's. Alan started growing orchids in 1969 with 3 Cymbidiums given to him by an aunt. While in college he became interested in other orchids and discovered many would grow outdoors in Southern California. He has moved five times as his orchid obsession has led to the need for more growing space. With the last move, he purchased 10 acres of land in Lincoln, California for his 300,000 orchids. He is recognized as an expert in the Brazilian Cattleya Alliance and a trend setter in miniature Cattleya breeding. Alan has been published in the Orchid Digest, and the American Orchid Society magazines. He has also been published in the proceedings of the World Orchid Conference. He is an internationally known speaker. He is a past member of the AOS Judging Committee, and the Research Committee, as well as an Accredited Judge and is Vice-chair and Training Coordinator for the California Sierra Nevada Judging Center. Alan also served two terms on the Orchid Digest Executive Committee and Board of Directors, and is one of the current directors, as well as Trustee for the AOS.

## Orchid fossil reveals flowers' domination of Earth

Forget mammals - flower power may have ruled after the dinosaurs died out. So say researchers who have discovered the first fossil orchid, a 15 to 20-million-year-old pollen specimen encased in amber, in the Dominican Republic.

This small orchid, from the Amazon region named Ligeophila sp., is one of the closest living relatives of the fossil orchid (Image: Gustavo Romero)

The Orchidaceae family boasts the largest of all flowering plants, but it is poorly understood, because until now there has been no fossil record of its history. Previous speculations put the plants' first appearance at about 45 million years ago.

Santiago Ramirez of Harvard University and colleagues compared genetic information from the fossilised Meliorchis caribea with modern-day plants and reconstructed an evolutionary tree. It suggests that the first orchids bloomed about 84 million years ago (Nature, vol 448, p 1042). Those that survived the mass extinction 65 million years ago then rapidly proliferated, leading to today's 28,000 or so species.

## SFOS SPEAKERS DAY 2007

SFOS will host its annual Speakers Day on Sunday, October 7, 2007 at the Sheraton Miami Mart Hotel & Convention Center, North Ballroom, 711 N.W. 72 Avenue, Miami. We have a wonderful panel of highly respected speakers presenting an enjoyable and educational program. Speakers Day also includes AOS Judging and SFOS Medal Judging. Plants for judging must be registered by 10:00 A.M. and can be picked up starting at 12:00 P.M. Speakers' Day has AOS approval for judging seminar credits as well. Several of our speakers will have plants to sell. Sales will be open only to registered seminar participants. This year's speakers are:

Sandy Ohlund from Rolling Prairie, Indiana, has been an avid orchid grower for twenty-five years and is an accredited American Orchid Society judge with the Great Lakes Judging Center. She is a frequent speaker at orchid societies and seminars, most recently as a featured speaker at the Paph Guild in Morro Bay, California. She has coauthored articles with noted orchid taxonomist Guido Braem, published in the French journal Richardiana, the Australian Orchid Review, and the Colombian journal Orchideología. Her orchid interests include paphs, phrags, and the vandaceous alliance.

To support her orchid addiction, she is Associate Professor of Spanish at Holy Cross College, Notre Dame, Indiana, where she also gives classes on orchid growing. The title of Sandy's presentation is: "Why Be Round? Renantheras, Arachnis and Paraphalaenopsis".

Jason Fischer of Orchids Limited will Lecture on "Breeding with Slipper Orchids". This lecture will cover the genera paphiopedilum & phragmipedium, and show characteristics and traits that result from breeding. It will also cover the steps taken in breeding from pollination to the first flowering, with a look into the lab process that is used to germinate orchids. Jason has a life-long education in orchids by having the opportunity to be raised in a family orchid business. He took interest in orchid hybridization and lab work around 14 years of age, and first started breeding with phalaenopsis, which later on led to paphs and phrags, and now just about anything he can get his hands on that is unique.

Ron McHatton, PhD is a chemist by training and is currently the AOS Director of Education and Regional Operations. Prior to that position he was Apopka production manager for Kerry's Bromeliad Nursery, possibly the largest wholesale orchid nursery in the United States. In addition to his professional position, Ron is an accredited American Orchid Society judge and he has also been a long-time supporter of the Orchid Digest. The title of Ron's talk is "The Orchid World in Microcosm – Masdevallia and Pleurothallis". This lecture will examine a slice of this diversity along with a discussion of some of the newest taxonomic changes and cultural information for those preferring warmer conditions.

Paul Alan Wetter, MD became interested in orchids in the late 1960's when he was studying the natural history of South Florida. Miami has been his home since childhood. He has been growing orchids as a hobby ever since, with a special interest in epiphytic orchids in the subtropical garden. In 2003 Paul joined the West Palm Beach Judging Center where he is an AOS Probationary Judge. Paul is a Professor Emeritus at the University Of Miami School Of Medicine and has been a pioneer in minimally invasive surgery and has numerous honors for his contributions to the field. His talk is titled "Red Phalaenopsis: A Pigment of Our Imagination"

Robert Fuchs President and Co-Chairman of the 19th World Orchid Conference will present "19WOC Update" and Dorothy Bennett, Judging Chair for the 19WOC, will present "19WOC Judging -- What Judges Can Expect". Bob is an accredited AOS judge in the West Palrm Beach Judging Center, and president of R.F. Orchids, Inc. Dorothy is Chairman of the AOS's West Palm Beach Judging Center.

## Hurricane Preparedness for Your Orchids

As another hurricane approaches the Gulf of Mexico I thought it would be appropriate to detail some of the things that you need to do if you believe you will be impacted by storms.

Before you do anything else for your plants (and this is true for all your potted plants) be sure to water thoroughly. Soak as many as possible so that the media retains water and will provide your plants with moisture for a longer than normal time. For the best protection you can provide them, plan to take all your plants indoors. Your house will be much more likely to survive the winds than any kind of greenhouse structure. I have an extra bedroom where I spread out plastic outdoor chair covers to hold my plants. I like these because they fold up on the sides and provide a mini-cocoon which contains humidity.

If you have time, spray all plants with some kind of bug spray before you bring them inside. They will be in much more crowded conditions inside than when they were outside and any bugs will be able to move from plant to plant easily. Use saucers of water between plants to increase humidity. Small plants in tiny pots can be placed in these saucers so they will not dry out.

The next issue will be space. If you have space inside for all of them, then you are very lucky. If not, then you're going to have to do some kind of triage on which will be saved and which will not. The first ones to bring inside are your favorites — those that bloom well for you and whose flowers you love. Next those that bloom for you, or any that are particularly valuable to you. As you run out of room, you will have to start making decisions. All of us who have been growing for any length of time will have some plants that are not doing well; some plants that

are on the verge of dying; some plants that are not dying, but are just sitting there taking up space. Those are the ones that you need to sacrifice if space is an issue.

Anything that is left outside should be placed on the ground in a structure – your greenhouse, a shed, or a garage. Even though they might get water, either sea water or rain water, they will still be better off than if they were up in the air and blown down. Then not only will they be wet, but damaged too.

Fill up your water barrels with water from your hose. They will be heavy enough not to blow away. In some areas after a storm is over the water supply is unreliable. This way you will have water available for your plants and to use in your toilets.
