

## **Orchid Growing Tips for Summer**

## As the weather warms, increase your watering schedule as needed

If you have taken your orchids outside for the summer be sure to check the pots every day. One really good suggestion that you will get from experienced growers is to learn what a pot feels like when it has been watered and what it feels like when it is dry. This is a simple way to tell if your plants need water. For Cattleyas and other tough plants, wait one extra day when they're dry and then water. Oncidiums and Phalaenopsis can stand misting every day and then a good watering twice a week. Watch for wrinkling on the pseudobulbs -- that's a sign of under watering.

# All orchids will need shading during the middle of the day

In all but the northernmost parts of the country, your orchids will grow best with early morning or eastern light and dappled shade the rest of the day. Some varieties such as Cymbidiums can take full afternoon sun, but most others will experience sunburn if so exposed. Phalaenopsis will get easily sunburned with large yellow and black areas where they have received too much sun. Cattleyas will first exhibit a definite reddish cast to the leaves which indicates that they are at the high exposure limit for that variety. Eventually they will also exhibit yellowing and damaged leaves. Oncidiums will show burning at the leaf ends.

#### Phalaenopsis or Moth Orchids

If your Phal has finished flowering and you want to try to get it to re-flower, cut the flower stem about one-half inch or two centimeters from the bottom. If the inflorescence (flower stem) is showing signs of putting out side branches, leave it alone and let it

continue to bloom. After blooming, the plant should be repotted in a bark or bark and charcoal orchid mix. I have found appropriate mix at local nurseries and hardware stores with garden centers. After repotting, let the plant recover in a shady location for about a month and then move to its normal spot.

#### Paphiopedilum or Slipper Orchids

Many Paphiopedilums will be reaching their peak growing periods, so be sure to give them the light and water conditions they will need for maximum growth. Multifloral (more than one flower on a spike) Paphiopedilums will be flowering or putting out new spikes, so check them often. Phragmipediums need to be kept very moist during the heat (I keep mine in a saucer with water) and provided with lots of light for their growth period. Unlike Paphiopedilums, Phragmipediums need lots of light to flower well.

#### Cattleyas

Spring blooming Cattleyas should be finished and any repotting necessary should be done now. Fall blooming Cattleyas may also be repotted now when their roots are about half an inch or two centimeters long. Be careful to watch for shriveling pseudobulbs indicating under watering. Increase your air circulation if possible to prevent rots. Particularly watch for any sign of black rot and treat immediately with a fungicide or you will lose your plant in about a week.

#### Three Popular Maxillaria -- tenuifolia, rufescens and variablis

The Maxillaria (max-il-LAR-ee-a) genus is composed of approximately 600-650 species all of which are found in South and Central America and the Caribbean as epiphytes and lithophytes as well as occa-

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sional terrestrials. They can be found from sea level to over 3,000 meter elevations in the Andes Mountains. Many of the species are large plants and are not known for having large or showy flowers -- the flowers rarely extend past the grass like foliage of the plants themselves. Some plants of the genus have highly fragrant flowers in a range of scents from coconut to vanilla and these are the ones that are prized by growers. The best known in cultivation is Maxillaria tenuifolia also known as the Coconut Orchid for its amazing coconut fragrance. Two additional species grown in cultivation are Maxillaria rufescens and Maxillaria variablis, considered easy to grow and tolerant of a wide range of temperatures.

Maxillaria tenuifolia is an attractive plant with branching leaves and flowers held just below the highest arch of the leaves. It has egg-shaped pseudobulbs and produces single flowers on a five inch, or thirteen centimeter, inflorescence. The deep red flowers with a cream lip are approximately two inches or five centimeters across and will perfume the air in a room. A native of Central America it is a summer bloomer, needs good light, and constant moisture as well as warm temperatures to flower well

Maxillaria rufescens is well known for its bright yellow flowers with a speckling on the lip that has a wonderful vanilla fragrance. The flowers are about half an inch, or three to four centimeters across, but this species shows a great deal of variability in flower color and size. One particularly nice thing about the species is that it flowers throughout the year so you will be able to enjoy the scent at almost any time. The species is found throughout the northern part of South America and in the Caribbean islands growing as an epiphyte in tropical forests. They need good humidity and even moisture to grow well as well as intermediate light conditions. Because of their size, these are good plants for a windowsill.

Maxillaria variablis flowers on short two inch or 5 centimeter inflorescences. The flowers can be yellow and red, dark red or several variations as can be deduced from the name variablis. This Maxillaria will also bloom throughout out the year reaching a height of approximately 8 inches or 20 centimeters. It has small pseudobulbs topped by a single leaf and flowers profusely when well grown. Good humidity, even moisture and bright light are important to grow this species well. This species should be grown as an intermediate with a minimum of 58 degrees and maximum of 88 degrees Fahrenheit or 14.5 to 31 degrees Centigrade.

### SFOS SPEAKERS' DAY 2006

SFOS will host its annual Speakers' Day on Sunday, October 1, 2006 at the Fire Fighters' Memorial Building, 8000 N.W. 21 Street, Miami. We have a wonderful panel of highly respected speakers presenting an enjoyable and educational program. Speakers' Day also includes AOS judging and SFOS Ribbon Judging (all points for Ribbon Judging will be doubled for this event). Plants for judging must be registered by 10:00 A.M. and can be picked up starting at 12:00 P.M. Speakers' Day has AOS approval for judging seminar credits as well. Several of our speakers will have plants to sell. Sales will be open only to registered seminar participants. This year's speakers are:

James Rose (California) will speak on Reed-Stem Epidendrums and standards for judging them. James along with his wife Lauris own Cal Orchids, a world renowned orchid nursery providing one of the largest varieties of orchid species and hybrids in the US. Most recently, the nursery has become recognized for their superior 'Pacific' line of reedstem Epidendrums. James has published in the AOS, Orchid Digest, and CSA magazines, and is well respected for his vast knowledge as well as his distinctive sense of humor. He lectures all over the world, at orchid shows and World Orchid Conferences. He is a Cymbidium Society of America Judge.

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former member of the AOS Conservation Committee, and active member of the Japan Grand Prix Organizing committee where he judges every year at the Tokyo Dome.

Fred Clarke (California) will speak on "New Hybrids with Catasetums, Cycnoches and Mormodes". His two programs will feature a widescreen computer slide show on some of the new hybrids and breakthroughs in the hybridization of Catasetum, Cycnoches and Mormodes. Fred has been growing orchids for 29 years and has been hybridizing for 19 of those years. With over 22 years as a professional grower and manager in the horticultural industry, Fred applies these skills at his orchid nursery. Sunset Valley Orchids, located in San Diego, California. His pioneering work in Catasetum intergeneric hybrids led to the development of several notable hybrids, most recently the grex, Fredclarkeara After Dark, which produced "the blackest flower ever witnessed". Fred is a Probationary Judge in the Pacific South Judging Region. His plants have received hundreds of quality awards from the American Orchid Society.

Andy Easton (Florida) will speak on warmth-tolerant cymbidiums and standards for judging them. Andy has been a professional orchid grower since 1973, specializing in the hybridization of Cymbidium, Odontoglossum Alliance, Cattleya Alliance and Paphiopedilums. He is currently proprietor of New Horizon Orchids, which generates new orchids for Floricultura in Europe and Mukoyama Orchids in Japan as well as supplying Hatfield Orchids for North American sales. Since arriving in Florida in mid-2000, Andy has worked on a unique line of truly heat-tolerant Cymbidiums that will grow and bloom reliably in the Homestead area and all points further north, and he will share his expertise with these orchids on Speakers' Day. He is an accredited AOS judge in the West Palm Beach Center.

Patricia Harding (Oregon) will speak on Encyclias and criteria for judging them. Patricia has an undergraduate degree in Botany, and upon retiring as a physician, decided to pursue her earlier interests in science. Patricia has been growing and collecting orchids, mostly species, off and on for 30 years, intensely for 20 years. Patricia was heavily involved with Carl Withner in his last book, The Debatable Epidendrums, learning a lot in the process, and is currently working on a book covering all the known species of the Huntleya Alliance. Patricia is also an accredited AOS judge in the Pacific Northwest Center.
