To begin with, thank you to SFOS for allowing me to share my experience in designing and building Shade Houses for orchid and plant growing in South Florida.

As South Floridians know, we have sun all year round, which is ideal for orchid growing. If you add other variables to the mix; ventilation, watering, and fertilizers, these complement the ideal conditions.

There are different ways to grow these delicate plants. The first thing to notice is which place is the most suitable for their purpose. One must chose a place depending on the type of orchid and its requirements. It's not easy because each species has its own characteristics. Sometimes you see plants in the gardens that surprise you with incredible flowers and it seems that they are not in their environment yet they are healthy. This is one of the big fascinations of the world of orchids and their cultivation.

The shade of the trees is the most used environment for its cultivation and with much success, but you only have to take into account the amount of light that filters its leaves. The ideal situation for cultivating orchids would be to have a structure 8'-9' high and with 50% shade; these are the ideal parameters for the great majority of orchids. We





always recommend the use of pebbles in the shade house floor, as this helps to maintain humidity. The side area of the structure has to be able to control the ventilation. A 30% shade for the sides is a suitable solution.



When we manufacture our shade houses or green houses, we use aluminum or galvanized iron and a shade cloth that can be 30%, 50% or 60%. It all depends on the specific needs of our customers.


Chuck McCartney

Conversations With Our Members: Barbara & Danny Lutz

Barbara and Danny Lutz are Registered Nurses. Barbara worked at Jackson Memorial Hospital as Associate Head Nurse of Neuro-Ortho-Trauma Rehab and Danny worked as AHN at JMH of Ortho-Trauma Spine.

We received our first orchid when Danny's parents moved to a condo and couldn't take it with them. We called it the "Armstrong Orchid" because Bud Armstrong, a co-worked of Danny's mother and a member of EALOC, gave it to his mother for her birthday. We found the EALOC in the Miami Herald when they used to print Miami news. We started to attend and found out orchids have names. The Armstrong orchid is actually Queen's Dowry and we think we are members of orchid clubs today because of it. We still have the Armstrong orchid, I mean Queen's Dowry.

We were members of EALOC and as we assisted in putting in their orchid display in the South Florida Orchid Show (then in Coconut Grove auditorium), Mona and George Heider asked us to volunteer for the orchid show. We started by assisting Mona and George, also members of EALOC, at the Hospitality table. When we retired in 2000 we were able to then assist with Security that was headed by Edwardo Marcellini. Since I can't share my tortellini with you I thought I'd share my "recipe". It's just one of the things I "throw together."

Barbara's Tortellini "Recipe"

- Tortellini any kind (I use Barilla dried 4 cheese tortellini when I can find it)
- Marinara Sauce homemade or your favorite brand (I use Publix Premium)
- Grated Parmesan Cheese
- Fresh Basil

Cook tortellini until just not quite al dente. Place some marinara sauce in a pan. How much depends on how much tortellini you've cooked. Mix some parmesan cheese in with the sauce to taste. Add the cooked tortellini and heat gently to allow the pasta to finish cooking. Top with coarsely chopped basil just before serving. Enjoy!





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

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
Meetings are held from 7 corM to 9:00PM on the third Woodesday of each month.
